Grades 11, 12

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The purpose of this course is to provide base level knowledge of jewelry techniques. Your growth will be based on sequential learning steps with emphasis on developing basic techniques and skills. As the course progresses, you will explore soldering, cold connecting, fabrication, chain making, etching, enameling, casting, and other techniques, as time allows. Our goal is to create six to ten different projects. Each project requires you to plan, draw, and design before the piece is executed. Projects will emphasize a particular material, technique, or design problem. Planning and process will comprise the majority of your project grade.

The course is designed around the following key concepts:

- Meaningful, hands-on learning experiences that allow personal growth and creative expression
- Integration of aesthetics, art criticism, art history, and studio production
- Sequentially planned experiences that build on concepts and provide learning opportunities that incorporate a variety of media, artistic styles and historical periods

Students will make and keep a sketchbook for brainstorming, planning, reflecting, and revising ideas. A digital art portfolio featuring selected works will be evaluated at the end of each quarter. In addition, students will self-examine completed works in an effort to foster a sense of accomplishment and commitment to high standards of art production. This course is written to the State and National Core Arts Standards.

COURSE METHODOLOGY:

This is an inquiry-based course where you will be challenged! Acting as a facilitator, I will guide you through an array of processes and techniques; however, as the learner, you are responsible for actively acquiring and applying knowledge by completing all assigned activities. Some Tuesdays will be dedicated to learning a new technique with the goal of the learner utilizing it in some manner in their work. School wide Art Challenges will be given each month as a way for students to further grow and develop problem solving and artistic skills.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Students in this course will be able to:

- Explain the value of Art.
- Use a sketchbook to plan projects and work out ideas.
- Exercise and demonstrate use and mastery of the Elements & Principles of Design.
- Use proper Visual Arts vocabulary.
- Use materials, tools and processes from a variety of media safely and effectively.
- Identify and explain different art movements & artist.
- Create original objects of art in a specific medium.
- Know and apply the four steps of art criticism.
- Properly photograph and document completed works of art.
- Use proper cleaning methods for an art studio.



ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS:

- How do artists work?
- How do artists and designers learn from trial and error?
- How does engaging in creating art enrich people's lives?
- How does knowing and using visual art vocabularies help us understand and interpret works of art?
- How does art help us understand the lives of people of different times, places, and cultures?
- How is art used to impact the views of a society?
- How does art preserve aspects of life?
- How does knowledge of line, shape, and value support drawing an accurate object(s)?
- How does knowing/identifying primary, secondary and intermediate/tertiary colors help us when creating?
- How does color choice affect the message the artist intends?
- How does understanding color mixing and color schemes help us relate the emotions, mood, and message the artist intends?
- How do I move my thought process from an additive process to a subtractive (relief) process?
- What are the steps for creating a subtractive piece of art?
- What tools can I use to create proportion and scale?
- Why is proportion and scale important in a composition?

The first three weeks will be dedicated to assembling a sketchbook, fabricating a supply bag, and making a portfolio. You will need your cardboard and poster board.

Your sketchbook will be the tool you use to cultivate ideas, journal, investigate the elements & principles, and design & refine your projects before executing them. You should work in your sketchbook daily!

You will professionally photograph each completed project and type an artist reflection/statement in your digital portfolio on Google Drive.

POWERSCHOOL & GRADING SCALE:

A grade of 0.0 in POWERSCHOOL indicates an assignment that students should have turned in and can still submit for scoring.

A grade of 0.1 in POWERSCHOOL indicates an assignment that students should have turned in, but can no longer submit for scoring.

CATEGORIES IN POWERSCHOOL:

40% = Performance Tasks: Visual Journal, Planning, Blogging

20% = Writing: Reflections, Artist Statements, Journaling, etc.

20% = Assessments: Digital Portfolio, Tests and quizzes, Exit slips, Bell ringers, etc.

20% = Labs: Daily Studio Maintenance and Participation

LATE WORK POLICY:

I will accept late work one week past the due date. After one week, you must submit a plan of action for completing the missing work. *Exceptions will be made for extenuating circumstances.

Attendance and punctuality are extremely important so that you will be able to participate in oral presentation, class discussions, and projects. You are responsible for all missed work due to absences. Due to the nature of having to work with materials in the art room, you will have 3 days to turn in late work for an excused absence. REDO, RELEAN, REASSESS:

Students can relearn/reassess assignments from the following categories:

- **Performance Tasks (projects):** This reassessment may occur when students meet the following criteria: completion of planning activities leading up to the project. These include but are not limited to sketchbook assignments, worksheets, research, etc.
- **Assessments (tests/quizzes)*does not include portfolio submissions:** This reassessment may occur when students meet the following criteria: show evidence of reteaching/relearning activities as outlined and agreed upon by student and teacher.

OPEN STUDIO:

This is an opportunity for students to catch up if they’ve missed class or to simply work on a project if they are falling behind and will not meet the due date. Open Studio is for students enrolled in the class only and is offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:30 – 4:00 other times by appointment.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

It is imperative that you are in class, on time every day! This is a studio class so 99% of the work will be done in class. Working with different art media can be challenging so attendance is important to ensure you are getting the full experience. If you miss class, you run the risk of missing important information, demonstrations, bell ringers, pop quizzes, and most importantly time to create and collaborate!
